Dear Mr. Hoffman:

This letter is written with regard to your request for verification of a jurisdictional delineation performed on your behalf by Advantage Engineers. The project center is located approximately 2,300 feet south of the intersection of Spring Hill Drive and Park View Drive, North Whitehall Township, Lehigh County, Pennsylvania.

The plans identified on the following page depict the extent of Federal jurisdiction on the subject property. The basis of our determination of jurisdiction is also provided (Enclosure 1).

Pursuant to Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act and Section 404 of the Clean Water Act, a Department of the Army permit is required for work or structures in navigable waters of the United States and the discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States including adjacent and isolated wetlands. Any proposal to perform the above activities within the area of Federal jurisdiction requires the prior approval of this office.

This delineation/determination has been conducted to identify the limits of the Corps Clean Water Act jurisdiction for the particular site identified in this request. This delineation/determination may not be valid for the wetland conservation provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985, as amended. If you or your tenant are U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) program participants, or anticipate participating in USDA programs, you should request a certified wetland determination from the local office of the Natural Resources Conservation Service prior to starting work. This letter is valid for a period of five (5) years. This jurisdictional determination is issued in accordance with current Federal regulations and is based upon the existing site conditions and information provided by you in your application. This office reserves the right to reevaluate and modify the jurisdictional determination at any time should the existing site conditions or Federal regulations change, or should the information provided by you prove to be false, incomplete or inaccurate.

This letter contains an approved jurisdictional determination for your subject site. If you object to this determination, you may request an administrative appeal under Corps regulations at 33 CFR 331. Enclosed you will find a combined Notification of Appeal Process (NAP) fact sheet and Request for Appeal (RFA) form (Enclosure 2). If you request to appeal this determination, you must submit a completed RFA form to the North Atlantic Division Office at the following address:

It is not necessary to submit an RFA form to the Division Office if you do not object to the determination in this letter.



Land use within the SPOE watershed can be characterized as agricultural, suburban residential and urban development. In recent years, the watershed has experienced increased developments. Wetland B and similarly situated waters provide stormwater retention and the filtering of pollutants in an area that is primarily agricultural but has seen an increase in impervious surfaces due to development. These waters also provide forested wetland habitat for birds, mammals, reptiles and amphibians. This habitat type is important and unique in the SPOE watershed. Waters of this size and position are uncommon within the SPOE, making their contributions critical to the physical, chemical and biological integrity of the Lehigh River ((a) (3) water).

Land use within the SPOE watershed can be characterized as agricultural, suburban residential and urban development. In recent years, the watershed has experienced increased development pressure in the form of warehouses, shopping centers and housing developments. Wetland C and similarly situated waters provide significant storage of stormwater after rain events and filter out pollutants from farmfields and impervious surfaces. These waters play an important role is groundwater recharge for the surrounding areas. Waters of this size and position are uncommon within the SPOE, making their contributions critical to the physical, chemical and biological integrity of the Lehigh River ((a) (3) water).

North Whitehall Twp.	Wetland D	Lehigh River	Wetland D is a forested wetland approximately 0.04 acres in size. The wetland was identified to be approximately 3,000 feet from Coplay Creek, an (a)(5) water. Similarly situated waters within the Single Point of Entry (SPOE) watershed were aggregated and assessed in this Significant Nexus Determination. Wetland D and similarly situated wetlands likely have more than speculative effects of the physical, chemical, or biological integrity of the Lehigh River. These wetlands may provide stormwater storage and pollutant filtering in a watershed with few forested wetlands.
